Praying to the God we know



n the book of 1 Samuel, we see a contrast between a man who knows God, the God of Israel, and a man who only knows about God.

David, the man who knows God, is often seen in this narrative seeking the face of God and inquiring of the Lord's priests and prophets before making major decisions. Sometimes he inquires again for certainty, even after God has already given him a general direction. Here is a man who seeks God's voice for guidance and direction.

By contrast, in King Saul we see a man whose sole focus is not the voice of the Lord, but a singular intent to destroy his invented enemy. He is driven to kill a man who has done nothing but good to him, to his household, and to his nation. He is seeking the life of a man who spared Saul's own life when he had a chance to destroy him. When Saul murders the priests of Nob, we see a man willing to kill those who dare to consult God and give God's wisdom to his perceived opponent. We see a man ordained by God to sit on a throne and lead God's own people, yet demonstrating no knowledge of the ways, character, or values of the God of Israel. Saul knows about God, but does he really know God? Because of this, his view of reality is distorted and his priorities bring harm.

Each year, we publish this Prayer Guide, which calls us all to pray together for the ministries to which God has called SIM around the world. It is easy to pull a list of countries together. It is even easy to gather prayer points and compile them in a book for all to use. However, it is a different story to do this because we know that God's people, those who truly know

him on an experiential level, will pray and that the God of the universe will answer.

People who merely know about God also pray, but not with the same spiritual conviction and effectiveness as those who know God. The one prays as a stranger reciting their written petition to a powerful person; the other prays as a child talking to a father. The latter prays with the conviction that our Father in heaven hears and answers, whether he does things our way or a different way.

People who only know about God pray because they have heard the stories of what God has done in the past, but give little attention to God's ongoing acts of grace in their own lives. People who know God pray not only because of God's work in the past but, like David, because they have experienced God's acts in their own lives, bringing salvation, deliverance from darkness to light, and release from the dominion of Satan to God (Acts 26:18). They have known God to the extent they can say, like David before King Saul in an earlier encounter: "The LORD who saved me from the paw of the lion and the paw of the bear, He will save me from the hand of this Philistine." (1 Samuel 17:37). They serve the God who saves, and whom they know they can call upon to save others.

There was only one reason David could face Goliath when everyone else in Israel, even the seasoned men of war, trembled before him: they knew about God, but David *knew* God.

May we all join our hearts and voices together this year and pray to the God of heaven for SIM workers, SIM ministries, SIM partners, and all those SIM is seeking to reach with the gospel, praying to the prayer-answering God – not just as people who have heard about him, but as people who know him, his word, and his ways.




Prayer Notes	

Kuvale, Himba, Vahakawona

Located in south western Angola, the majority of Kuvale, Himba, and Vahakawona live without the gospel. They are semi-nomadic, raising cattle and goats in a region frequently affected by drought. There are only a handful of churches among these three groups.

Ovangambwe e Ovamwila (Nyaneka)

These two closely related groups are also in south western Angola. The Ovangambwes' lives revolve around keeping cattle. A church has been well established, incorporating five preaching points. Believers are awakening to the Lordship of Jesus and are now turning their backs on spirit worship practices.





have turned to the Lord and are keen to evangelise. Village churches and preaching points are multiplying. Although the New Testament translation into Nyaneka is nearing completion, only six of these village churches have leaders with basic Bible training.

- national mission workers for all the least-reached communities of Angola
- translators for the 15 languages in Angola which still need Bible translations
- disciple-making to become the DNA of churches throughout Angola. Many believers need to discover a daily walk with Jesus as his disciples
- the Jesus Film to be greatly used to make Jesus known in south western Angola

Australia



Vision

Increasing secularisation

Traditionally a Christian nation with freedom of religion, Australia is becoming increasingly secularised. The dominant ideology has become an individualistic, New Age spirituality with no accountability.

While 52.1 per cent of Australians identify themselves in some way as Christian,

only eight per cent attend church regularly.

Antagonism towards the church, and to its perceived intolerance and authoritarianism, is increasing, especially in the media.

Immigrants, refugees, overseas students

Australia is one of the most culturally diverse nations in the world, with 30 per cent of the population born overseas and up to 700,000 international students arriving each year prior to Covid-19.

These immigrants and students have brought a variety of religions with them. To faithfully reach these people groups in our own backyard,






SIM Australia has developed a local ministry called *Across. Across* helps SIM mission workers within Australia reach communities which have yet to hear the gospel, such as migrants, refugees, and university students.

Bangladesh

- Arsenic Poisoning Prevention Programme: providing education, filters and treatment for arsenic poisoning, a common condition in Bangladesh.
- Transformation centres: providing education opportunities, such as English language classes and primary classes for children in the slums to promote new development in impoverished communities.
- Morningstar Children's Centre: providing primary education to impoverished and under-served children.
- Salam Training Centre: a vocational school providing trade training for young people to develop life skills.
- Bible correspondence school: a distance learning school to disciple Christians throughout the country.

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Bengali

Bengalis are by far the largest ethnic community in Bangladesh, a densely populated country of about 165 million people. Bengalis are very conversational, hospitable, and community-minded people. Many of them revere God and desire to please him, but don't know the good news as presented in the Bible.


The capital, Dhaka, is a bustling mega-city which is home to more than 18 million people. Yet the majority of Bengali people live in rural villages scattered throughout the country.

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Muslims


We are finally seeing what our greatest remaining and unfinished task is: reaching millions of Muslims.

When the SIM pioneers came in 1946, more than 90 per cent of the one million northern 'Dahomeyans' were animistic.

Seven larger animistic tribes outnumbered two Muslim tribes. SIM went to the larger animistic tribes, as well as to the southern Fulani who were more animistic than Islamic.

SIM Benin's entire vision focused on reaching the rural animists in up to 10 languages; but they did not go to the Dendi Muslims or the northern Fulani Muslims.


When we speak of the 'unreached', we have the 'hard' and then the 'hardest'. SIM went to the 'hard'. It took the coming of the Evangelical Baptists working from Niger to open up work among the northern Dendi in 1974. It took 40 more years before urban Dendi and northern Fulani were seriously



addressed. By then, Islam had swept through all the northern tribes and Muslims now make up more than 80 per cent of the northern population. For northern Benin, the Muslim minority of 1946 became the Muslim majority of millions. Pray that local churches will find ways to invite mission workers for this unfinished task. Pray that SIM will recruit a new generation of workers and pray that Benin will even send out her sons and daughters as workers in other Muslim fields in Africa.

Children with disabilities

Bolivian society often overlooks children with disabilities and their families or care-givers. SIM workers are forming parent support groups and providing teacher training so they can better educate children with disabilities in their classrooms.

Quechuas in urban and rural areas


Many Quechua people have moved to cities for work, to search for educational opportunities and to better their lives. Others continue to live in small, scattered communities in the countryside.

SIM workers partner with small churches of Quechua migrants in outlying neighbourhoods to build up believers to reach their communities for Christ. Quechuas maintain links to the countryside, which open doors for outreach and discipleship among village dwellers.

Remote dwellers of the Kalahari Desert

The San are considered to have the oldest culture in the world. Beautiful San rock art can be seen throughout southern Africa, where the San lived as hunter-gatherers. The San are expert hunters, using bows and poison-tipped arrows. Hunting is a collaborative exercise, and the meat is always shared among the group.

Over the past 2,000 years, the San have slowly been pushed to live in the arid sands of the Kalahari Desert by Bantu tribes and white farmers, who have taken the more fertile land for their crops and livestock. Today, the San find it very difficult to maintain their traditional culture and




lifestyle. Land the San used to hunt on is increasingly being used for grazing cattle.

In partnership with the Africa Evangelical Church, SIM has engaged with the !Xoon San of the Kalahari for more than 30 years. For 16 years, the ministry was carried out by full-time mission workers living in the desert. These mission workers retired in 2018, leaving a translation of the gospel of Luke, around 90 recorded Bible stories, Sunday school material, and a worship CD as their legacy, as well as local translators who now carry on this work.

Internally displaced people

While Burkina Faso was once known for its stability, recent terrorist activity has led to an epidemic of internally displaced people. In March 2022, the UN estimated that more than 1.7 million people have been displaced from their homes by violence since 2019.

Many of these people are living in makeshift refugee camps, where water and food are scarce. Several camps have become targets for violence, causing a second displacement for those who had taken refuge. Other displaced people are seeking shelter with extended family, which can put already fragile financial situations under extreme stress. Malnutrition is a growing issue in the face of food shortages, decreased access to markets and inflation.

Most people in Burkina Faso depend on their farms for their food and their livelihood. With the current unrest, large portions of farming land are not accessible due to security risks and fear, leading to a threat of famine.

As a result of the violence, schools, churches, and village markets continue to close. As of December 2021, 3,280 schools

had closed, denying approximately 511,221 students access to education.

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New Canadians


According to the 2016 census, 7.5 million foreign-born people have come to Canada through the immigration process. They make up one in five people in Canada. This is an opportunity for Canadians to share the gospel in communities where Christ is least known, right in our own backyard. Immigrants in Canada list more than 200 places of birth outside their adopted country.

Pray for our Canada field workers, who work in many of these communities. Pray they would have many opportunities to share the gospel and make newcomers feel welcome in Canada.


In partnership with ProVisión, a Chilean sending agency, we work to empower the Chilean church to grow in its ability and


The Fulani

The Fulani are heavily impacted by the rise of terrorism in the West African region. Some are disillusioned by the fruits of militant Islam, while others are drawn to the opportunities or fraternity of militant Islam. Numerous Scripture materials are available in Fulfulde. Pray that this

changing dynamic might provide fertile hearts for the gospel to take root and flourish.

Fulani people groups

The Fulani population is made up of 40 million people in 20 West African countries. The East African Office has already sent five mission families to serve among them.

We thank God that the call to reach this people group is growing tremendously. As a result of continuous prayer, we have been able to send another five mission workers to the West Africa region, focusing on Fulani people groups. We thank God for the response of local churches in the East Africa region to the call to serve Fulani people.

East Asia



Vision

We want to turn mission fields into mission forces, while also receiving workers into some of our countries. 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Indonesia's majority peoples

Evangelical Christians make up only 3.21 per cent of the population, so many of Indonesia's 279 million people do not have much contact with witnesses to the saving power of 'Isa al Masih' (Jesus the Messiah).

Some large communities without Christ exist throughout Indonesia's more than 13,000 inhabited islands, with similar lifestyle characteristics and similar, yet distinct, languages. Large clusters like Aceh, Banjar, Barito, Betawi, Bugis, Deli, Jawa, Kaili, Lampung, Madura, Maluku, Melayu, Minangkabau, Pasemah, Sasak, Sunda, and Tukangbesi are comprised of smaller language groups, almost 230 in all.

While most communities identify with the majority religion, almost all practise some animism. More people are needed to live among these communities and to mobilise, motivate, encourage and train

Indonesia's evangelical churches for cross-cultural mission in their own country.





Diaspora Ministries

Diaspora ministries are gaining significance as more and more Chinese, Indonesian and Indian diaspora communities and international students are moving in huge numbers to East Asia and other parts of the world. As they are turning into a rich harvest field, it is a *Kairos* moment to share the love of Christ with them. SIM East Asia is keen to strategise and reach out to these communities with the gospel of Christ along with partnering churches and like-minded organisations.

Vision

The vision of SIM Ecuador is to see a witness to Christ's love where he is least known, disciples of Jesus expressing God's love in their communities, and Christ-centred churches among all peoples.

- Waves of Hope radio station (new focus on rural areas, evangelistic/equipping/ counselling programmes).
- Equipping leaders (growing pastors, theological education, bookshop, training conferences).
- Compassion ministries (medical aid, finance management, business as mission, family gardens, trauma healing).

Rural population in Loja province

Most rural towns in Loja have no local church and many small towns have no gospel presence at all. As the church in Loja city matures, it is beginning to participate in the Great Commission, and SIM Ecuador aims to walk beside its workers as they evangelise and plant churches in rural areas.

We use Bible story-telling and simple Bible discovery approaches to teach and disciple believers in Christian communities in homes.




Locals who take ownership of disciple-making are crucial, so the good news can be spread to even more remote areas. A need for foundational Bible doctrine calls for teaching and training in a simple and reproducible manner, to avoid divisions and confusion among the few rural believers.

Youth and students

Ecuador is a young nation! Youth disillusioned by their parents' traditional, works-orientated religion, are desperate for the truth about Jesus. SIM reaches out with biblical truth to young people and university students through social media, arts, English/campus ministries and sports. True Christian community throughout the week is desperately needed among the young people.

- confidence and training for rural believers who are hesitant to reach out to their families and neighbours with the gospel; passion in local Christians and local churches to come alongside expatriate workers and reach Loja province
- more workers living in the rural area who can focus on multiplication, and involve the locals from the beginning, trusting fully in the Holy Spirit
- Radio Hope's two additional repeaters on air, covering two thirds of the Loja
 province population, making up roughly 300,000 people. Pray for wisdom in
 creating the content and the impact it will have among urban and rural people
- the Equipping Leaders ministries to develop stable, maturing leaders, especially in rural communities, through training programmes and ongoing discipleship
- workers to develop SIM's Sports Friends ministry in rural areas
- the partnership with a local sending agency and for impact in the area of mobilising the church for mission

Eritrea



Vision

SIM first entered Eritrea in the early 1950s, and its focus has been assisting the Kale Heywet Church. In July 2004, the few remaining SIM workers in Eritrea were forced out of the country after their work permit applications were rejected. All SIM ministries have been closed, and evangelical Christians in Eritrea are undergoing severe persecution. SIM now supports a radio ministry in the Tigrinya language, Selamna Radio, broadcasting to Eritrea and Eritreans in the diaspora.

We want to see Tigrinya-speaking young people in Eritrea and in the diaspora reached with the gospel through the radio and social media.

Afar

The Afar are found in the East African countries of Djibouti, Ethiopia and Eritrea. The Afar consist of two sub-groups: the *Asaemara* and the *Adaemara*. Early in their history, the Afar were heavily influenced by Islam, which is still held in great esteem, although nany pre-Islamic beliefs and customs are still prevalent.




Beja

The Beja are a group of nomadic pastoralists who live scattered across the desert regions of Sudan, Egypt and Eritrea. They represent the largest non-Arabic ethnic group between the Nile River and the Red Sea. The Beja are Muslims who practise folk Islam. Most of their beliefs are interwoven with a wide variety of traditional beliefs.



- the Eritrean church, particularly the Kale Heywet Church, to flourish even under ongoing threats of persecution
- the listeners of the radio broadcasts, especially the young people, to cultivate a personal relationship with God, express increased commitment to him and his church, and actively participate in disciple-making

Ethiopia



Vision

Compelled by God's love and by the reality that millions of people live and die without knowing Christ, we strive to expand the church's capacity to make disciples and multiply churches in communities where Christ is least known, so that the triune God alone may be genuinely worshipped by every person.

Ministry

- Least Reached People: in communities where Christ is least known, or church not well established,

Children and youth

Well over half the population of Ethiopia (approximately 117 million people) is under the age of 20. As a result of rapid population growth, migration to urban areas and the availability of technology and the internet, most of these young people have limited opportunities to come to know Christ and become his followers.



Vulnerable

The urban population has increased to around 20 per cent of this primarily rural country and the rate of change is increasing. Poverty and abuse remain major issues, especially among newcomers to urban areas. Girls and homeless street boys are at risk of being trafficked.

- Churches and individuals to see the value in children and youth ministries and to prioritise time, energy and budget to empower them

Foreign students

There are about 358,000 foreign students in France. Moroccan students have become the largest group (more than 42,000), but there are also many Algerians (31,000) and Tunisians (13,000). Almost 51 per cent of France's foreign students come from Africa, including the Maghreb region.

Foreign students are often open to the gospel, but more workers are needed. Currently, only one SIM worker ministers among them.





Muslim community

The Muslim community in France is approximately nine per cent of the total

population. This figure includes all the immigrants coming from predominantly Muslim countries. Studies give an estimate of 70,000 to 110,000 Christians among this group. A large part of the community is second, third, or even fourth generation immigrant.

The 2016 influx of refugees is challenging European Christians to find ways of showing Christ's love. Following terrorist violence in 2016, the Muslim community has begun to question Islam. Muslim background believers are often persecuted by their families and relatives, but the terrorist incidents have led to more opportunities to discuss our Christian beliefs with Muslims.

The predominant people groups coming to, or settled in, Germany include Syrians, Iraqis, Afghanis, Pakistanis, Somalis, Eritreans, Kurds, Turks, and English- and French-speaking West Africans.

The Ruhr region

The Ruhr region, in Northrhine-Westfalia, is the largest



metropolitan area in Germany, with a population of 5.1 million and annual growth of 43,000 people, spread over 53 cities. This region has the highest migration density in Germany, from every nation (eg 26 per cent Turkish and 18 per cent Polish). It also has the highest number of students and foreign students in Germany.

International (multicultural) community and students


Our organisation is reaching out to the multi-cultural community in cities. There are 395,000 overseas students studying at universities in Germany. The largest group is from Asia, with significant groups from India (20,800), Syria (13,600), Iran (9,500), and Vietnam (3,200).

Secular Germans

Germany is rapidly becoming a secularised country. Regions in eastern and northern Germany have little or no local/personal Christian witness. Opportunities exist for workers from all over the world.

The Fulani


The Fulani people are scattered throughout Ghana. Through language and culture learning, the team have continued to build relationships and a number of Fulani have come to know and follow Jesus.

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
Fulani

There are almost four and a half million Fulani in Guinea. The vast majority are not Christians. While the New Testament has been translated into their language, translators are currently working on much of the Old Testament. There is also need for much prayer for the Fulani believers who gather throughout Guinea. Evangelism efforts continue throughout the country led by local believers, mission workers, and believers from other people groups.

Buddhists

Pilgrims have been coming to India since the time of Buddha (ca 563-483BC), seeking enlightenment and merit in the sacred sites and ancient monasteries. Buddhists believe that under a tree in the current-day Indian state of Bihar, Siddhartha Gautama (Buddha) achieved enlightenment and received the four noble truths that form the basis of Buddhist beliefs; all of life is suffering, the cause of suffering is



desire, the end of desire leads to the end of suffering, and the means to end desire is a path of discipline and meditation.

Today around 8.4 million people practise Buddhism in India (2011 census). Tibetan refugees and some Himalayan communities in the north practise the 'Way of the Lightning Bolt', which stresses individual spiritual advancement with the help of intercession from bodhisattvas (enlightened beings).

Buddhism is sometimes seen as a way to escape the Hindu caste system and Buddhist ideals are embraced in many levels of society.

Sundanese

The Sundanese are the largest Muslim group in Indonesia. With a population of 32 million and only 25,000 Jesus-followers, they are less than one per cent evangelised. They live primarily in West Java. Traditionally farmers, they have mainly grown rice and tea, but some have done well in government and others in trading. Recent industrial development and housing projects have initiated lifestyle changes among them.

Known for their friendliness, Sundanese have much in common with the Javanese in the way they dress and in their types of farming. But while Javanese are quite formal and hierarchical, the Sundanese are more open and informal.


Three main authorities influence

Sundanese life: religious leaders - ustadz (teachers of Islam) and imams (ceremonial priests); local government leaders; and dukun (shamans). These people control a tight-knit community, but also mix Islam with animistic practices. New followers of Jesus face fierce opposition from family members but are often very zealous witnesses to the power of the gospel.

Vision

Our vision is to see a vibrant community of servant leaders with vision, character and competence leading the church in Japan. We aim to identify, develop and release emerging Kingdom leaders who will unite the church, multiply leaders and congregations, and extend the transforming power of the gospel of Jesus Christ. SIM mission workers are pursuing these goals in partnership with local churches and Asian Access Japan (A2J).

- We partner with A2J, a Japanese-led movement of churches working throughout most regions and denominations within Japan. A2J is focused on training pastors, encouraging young leaders, supporting regional church multiplication, and uniting the church in Japan to reach two per cent of the population with the gospel.
- We partner with local churches and networks to multiply disciples and churches in Tohoku and Kanto.
- We encourage our mission workers to use their gifting and talents to promote church multiplication on a regional and national level.

Rural or non-urban Japan ('inaka')

More than 30 million people live in rural Japan (ie municipalities under 50,000 people).

The Christian population of these areas is estimated to be 0.1 per cent, and roughly two-thirds of these towns do not have a church.

Following earthquakes in Tohoku (2011) and Kumamoto (2016), there has been reason for optimism. Churches have been started and people who have been historically resistant to Christianity, such as farmers and fishermen, have become Christ-followers. A2J continues to prioritise partnering with church multiplication projects in these least reached areas.






Yamagata

A2J initiated a partnership with five visionary pastors and congregations in Yamagata to begin a new experiment in church

multiplication in 1996. Long considered to be one of the most difficult challenges in Japan, church planting suddenly became easier by networking a group of churches together who would move through the experience of establishing new churches.

Almost 30 years later, A2J is launching a new network, including many of these original mother and daughter churches. The plan is also for at least four mission worker units to partner with this church multiplication network.

Vision

SIM Kenya owes its existence to Somalis, one of the most resistant groups to the gospel and the largest tribe among Cushitic tribes in Kenya. In the latter part of the 1970s, Africa Inland Mission invited SIM workers to come to Kenya under their umbrella and work among the Somalis in Wajir, Nairobi, and Mombasa. We long to see communities where Christ is least known being transformed by the gospel.

Digo

The Digo are an East African tribe, concentrated on the southern coastal strip of Kenya between Mombasa and the border of Tanzania. It is rather surprising to find that in a country that is largely Christian, the Digo are nearly all Muslim. The Digo have never been reached successfully with the gospel. The religious practices of the Digo are deeply rooted in spiritism and folk Islam.

Orma

The Orma are a semi-nomadic people who live in the south-eastern parts of Kenya in Tana River and Lamu counties. The Orma are almost exclusively Muslim and have been so for three or four generations. They are devoted in their faith, observing all the rites and religious festivals of Islam. Most of the Orma have never heard the name of Jesus as the son of God, but that Jesus was simply a prophet, teacher or a good man.

MZ Generation

The term 'MZ Generation' covers the millennial generation, born in the early 1980s to the early 2000s, and Generation Z, born in the mid-1990s to the early 2000s.

Just 17 per cent of Korea's population is Christian, but that falls to five per cent of the MZs. In the past five years, the rate of Christians falling away has doubled and the major reason seems to be the negative perception of the church.

Surveys also show 42 per cent of people have had contact with heresy, while 66 per cent are happy to recognise homosexual relationships. That is why we need to pay attention to the 'MZ' generation. Efforts are urgently needed to listen to their stories, to show them the love and compassion of Christ, and to share the right gospel with them.






Community B

With the strictest economic sanctions in history and the most complete blockade ever enforced, very little ministry can be done publicly in this region. The border was closed two years ago because of Covid-19 and this has exacerbated food shortages. Hospitals are unable to provide adequate treatment due to a lack of medicines.

SIM Latinoamérica is proud to support Latin Americans who serve in countries including Ethiopia, Cote d'Ivoire, Kenya, the Middle East, Mozambique, Niger, Thailand and South Africa.

We work with churches and mobilisers throughout Central and South America, the Caribbean, and Mexico to provide resources and training to enable the Latin American church to rise up and send out workers to the harvest.



Remote rural peoples

Among the many ethnic groups in Liberia, there are people who live in remote areas of the deep forest or coastal swamp and have never had someone tell them about Jesus Christ. Some primarily speak a dialect of a language that is not spoken outside their region. They maintain their own forms of spirit and ancestor worship, and they educate their children in traditional ways.

Liberia's road system is poor and skeletal, so remote rural people never travel beyond the closest market town. Some places have never had a visitor to their home village.

The Evangelical Church of Liberia (ECOL) carried out a medical outreach in one such village. The team and supplies had to be flown in by a helicopter because the area is surrounded by rivers with no bridges. Some of






the team walked for hours to reach the clinic, and local people heard that these people came in the name of Jesus. Elders from one town asked ECOL to please send mission workers to tell them more.

- God to call Liberians as mission workers to people in remote areas, sent out by Liberian churches who feel burdened for their neighbours' salvation
- Liberian church leaders to be equipped to discern and dispute false teachings
- the Evangelical Seminary of West Africa (ESWA), the first graduate level theological school in Liberia

Comoros

The Comorians live on a chain of islands in the Indian Ocean between Madagascar and Mozambique. Each of the Comorian groups takes its name from the particular island on which the people live, but the official name of the islands is the Federal and Islamic Republic of the Comoros.

Major challenges on the Comoros Islands include poverty, disease, and hunger. Educational levels are low and less than half the population is literate. Although French and Arabic are the official languages, the Comorians speak a Swahili dialect. Children are expected to help with the farming, fishing, and animal care.


Polygamy is practised among the Comorians.

The Comorians are Muslim, but occultism and spirit possession are mixed with their Islamic practices. Traditionally, they have been resistant to any kind of religious change; however, they are gradually becoming more receptive to other ideas. Christian resources are limited and, as a result, the number of Comorian believers is very small.

Pray for

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- pastoral training in Antananarivo, Mandritsara and Mahatsara
- · more missional health care workers for Christian hospitals
- the Lord to call mission workers who can establish a local SIM administration to serve our mission team with financial, administrative, and personnel services and leadership

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The Yao

SIM has been working among the Yao since the late 1980s. The Yao are the third largest ethnic group in Malawi and are predominately Muslim. The Yao are spread across the eastern region of Malawi. SIM has been involved in Bible translation, church planting and radio ministries to the Yao.

In partnership with the Bible Society, the Scriptures were translated into Chiyao, and the full Chiyao Bible was published in 2014.

SIM also partners with OM in the ministry of Radio Lilanguka ('light' in Chiyao), a community radio station based in Mangochi.

A multicultural team of SIM mission workers is currently engaged in church planting among






the Yao in the hill areas near Mangochi. Yao believers are being discipled and equipped to reach more Yao communities where Jesus is least known. A young Yao couple are undertaking theological training at a Bible college, with the aim of returning to pastor a Yao church.

A piece of land has been purchased to be developed into a SIM mission base in one of the communities. There are plans for a church building, mission houses, and ministry facilities to be built in the future.

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The deaf community

In 1956, Andrew Foster founded the Christian Mission for the Deaf. His goal was to break the many barriers deaf people face in accessing the word of God, including illiteracy, isolation, stigma, stereotypes, communication, and people who are cruel and mean. In Mali, deafness is considered a divine curse. All these factors hinder the integration of deaf people into communities.



Foster knew education could help him achieve his vision, so he introduced American Sign Language and established deaf schools across Africa. He understood this would open up access to the gospel for deaf people in Mali.

However, government authorities wanted Foster's vision reduced to a simple association for the deaf called AMASOURD. To fulfil his dream, Foster looked at other countries of the sub-region, including Cote d'Ivoire, Ghana and Nigeria.


Unfortunately, Foster died in a plane crash in 1986. Today, AMASOURD exists in Mali, but is not associated with Christ's redemption story.

The deaf population in Mali is not well known at the national level, despite the presence of AMASOURD. Sources estimate the deaf population at 40,000 to 70,000. Among them, the percentage of Christians is minimal. No church denomination in Mali has a sign language translator. Also, no known mission agency is prioritising the deaf in Mali.

SIM has been raising awareness within the body of Christ about the need for a ministry among this group. The first workshop on bringing the gospel of Christ to the deaf took place in August 2015 in Bamako, and all the denominations were invited. In December 2017, a team of six young people, under the direction of Moody Bible College, travelled from the United States to Mali for a one-week teaching programme at Jigiya Kalanso, a school for the deaf in Bamako. A SIM associate is presently learning the ASL and has done an extensive study of attitudes toward the deaf in Mali which he will defend and publish this year.

Mauritius

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Muslims and Hindus

The least-reached people groups of Mauritius are Muslims and Hindus. Hindus represent nearly half the population of Mauritius. Hinduism in Mauritius originates from India. Many hierarchical and economic sub-groups exist, with the best known being the Brahmins - the priestly community. The Brahmins form the religious backbone of Hinduism.



The Bhojpuris are an ethnic sub-group and make up the majority of Indians in Mauritius. Muslim communities, too, are proud of their religion and heritage. The same is true of many nominally religious Christian people.

Only the gospel of Jesus Christ has the power to break through the religious barriers.

As we and our local partners invest in relationships, we pray that many from the majority communities will understand and accept the gospel through the witness of our lives, friendship, testimony and gospel presentation.





Marginalised people

Regional conflicts and economic challenges

have prompted huge movements of people over recent years, compounding the plight of those already disadvantaged or marginalised. Economic collapse and Covid-19 have intensified these challenges, bringing widespread hopelessness and a desire to emigrate.

Care for the vulnerable is a focus of many of the ministries we serve in. As churches adjust programmes, train their people, and reach out with Christ's compassion, we rejoice that unprecedented numbers are finding hope, peace and life in Christ.

Mongolia

Prayer Notes	

Nearly half the population of Mongolia lives in the capital city, Ulaanbaatar. Culturally and practically, the city is very different from the sparsely populated countryside.

The city is divided into two groups — those who live in apartment buildings and those who dwell in the ger district which rings the city. Gers are the traditional tent homes of the Mongolian nomads. Each year, the ger districts



are expanding, as nomads leave the traditional way of life to move to the city and establish new homes on small plots of land.

In the mid-1990s, Mongolia opened, allowing mission workers to enter and share the gospel. The Lord opened the hearts of many people, and the Mongolian church experienced rapid growth and wide church planting.

The Mongolian church is still very much in its first generation and faces challenges as its members continue to seek to grow and develop a God-honouring identity. The nation faces the challenges of balancing the rapid growth of secularisation with the traditional, underpinning views of Buddhism and shamanistic faith. This has led many Mongolians to ask what it means to be Mongolian today.

The greatest need of the Mongolian church is to develop a strong foundation of biblical truth. SIM Mongolia seeks to walk alongside the Mongolian church to strengthen its foundation, to disciple and mentor local leaders and to facilitate both urban and rural outreach.

Yao

It's said that to be a Yao is to be a Muslim. For centuries, the Yao people have been mixing traditional African beliefs with Islam to form a syncretic belief system. The Yao people were once the fierce slave hunters of the north. Today, most of the 500,000 Yao in north west Mozambique are subsistence farmers. Many are illiterate, with a low life expectancy.

Recently, the Yao have begun to respond to the gospel. In the past five years, the number of Yao Christians in Mozambique has grown from around 300 to 1,000. There is no better time than the present for evangelism and discipleship ministries.

Makuwa-Metto and Makuwa-Chirima

There are about one million people in each of these groups. The Makuwa peoples trace their family lines through their mothers. Most people are subsistence






farmers, working their fields with only handheld implements, but there is a trend toward Makuwas moving to the towns and cities, where unemployment and promiscuity are prominent.

Most adhere to folk Islam or folk Catholicism. In urban areas, where some small churches exist, well-trained leaders are needed. A translation of the Bible into the Chirima language is almost complete. This will facilitate evangelism and discipleship.

- a fruitful harvest of new believers, and for ongoing discipleship among the Yao
- revival among the churches in Cuamba
- new church plants in the villages of Massogo and Bandeze

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Buddhist majority communities

The main ethnic group, the Bamar, are the political, economic and religious leaders of Myanmar. They speak Burmese, the official language. The majority are Buddhists, but they also practise a form of spirit worship called 'nat worship'. Burmese spend their lives trying to appease the nats.

People without limbs

More than 300,000 people need prosthetics or orthotics in Myanmar. Only 25 per cent have access to these services. The missional business in Taunggyi is the first start-up in this field in Myanmar.

People without hope

Two years of COVID and over a year of political unrest have left many young people

without hope. Many education facilities are closed and stable employment is scarce. Young adults see no future in Myanmar.


At a missional business academy based in Yangon, we see youth trained with meaningful skills that lead to internships and remote work with international companies. Interactions with the students will provide opportunities to build relationships, provide life coaching and lead to spiritual conversations. Eventually, we hope to link new disciples to local churches.

While a large part of the population claim Christianity in name, a much smaller percentage are actually following Christ with their lives. Through the formal theological education at Namibia Evangelical Theological Seminary (NETS), SIM is equipping church



leaders to make disciples in their own congregations and reach the least reached in their communities with the gospel.

Migrants

All New Zealanders are migrants, first from other Pacific Islands; then, over the past 200 years, mainly from Europe. Now New Zealand opens its doors to a mixture of migrants and refugees from many countries, broadening the nation's ethnic diversity and bringing the world's people groups to New Zealand.


The most common new immigrants are Asian (Indian, Chinese, Filipino and others), gradually growing to more than 15 per cent of the population. There are fewer – but increasing – numbers of migrants from Africa, the Middle East and South America. While not all New Zealanders welcome immigrants, there is a huge well-spring in the community to do so.

SIM New Zealand's depth of practical experience in cross-cultural work, makes this a God-given opportunity to share wisdom with other New Zealanders, especially through churches.

Vision

To make disciples where Christ is least known. We live in a world permeated by an evil that has invaded and corrupted every aspect of life, leaving humankind separated from the creator and trapped in sin.

We are convinced the gospel changes everything and sets us free. God has called SIM to help bring this life-changing message to Niger. We are convinced no one should live and die without hearing the good news, yet more than 17 million people are living and dying without Christ in Niger.

We believe that we are called to mobilise Christ's servants to bring the message of salvation to Niger.

We are called by God from all corners of the earth to serve as a diverse ministry team.

- Outreach: university outreach centre (Foyer Evangelique Universitaire), personal discipleship, literacy, people group focus, translation, and media.
- Community services: Galmi Hospital, Danja Health Center, Sowing Seeds of Change in the Sahel, and the Dorcas Project (widows ministry).
- Education: ESPriT Seminary, Sahel Academy, Maza Tsaye Centre of Ministries, and the Pan-African Academy of Christian Surgeons' surgical training.
- Leadership and services: administration, SIMAIR, guest houses, leadership, church-mission relations.

Danja Medical Centre

The centre provides holistic medical care in the Maradi area. It focuses primarily on women with obstetric fistulas, people who have been diagnosed with leprosy, and people with serious wounds, including those caused by diabetes or burns. They also have a basic outpatient clinic and a physical therapy unit.

The gospel is proclaimed in the waiting room and those who stay for an extended period of time, such as the women with fistula and those needing extensive wound care, hear the gospel numerous times. While the women recover from fistula surgery, they are taught a trade so they can earn an income.

In addition to medical care, there is a thriving outreach ministry around Danja. Often the evangelism team is invited by former patients to come and share the gospel in their villages.





- patients, who are often the outcasts in society, to find the love of Jesus through the gentle care of the medical staff
- God's protection over the evangelistic team as they share the gospel and disciple new believers
- financial provision for the medical centre, especially for the fistula centre, which does not charge patients for their extended stay
- emotional, spiritual, and physical stamina for the mission workers and local staff at the hospital they all see many difficult cases

 include a director for the university centre; principals for the high school and

- more teachers for Sahel Academy. The excellent education children receive at Sahel allows their parents to carry out their ministries in Niger
- the churches associated with SIM in Niger. Pray for the pastors to be men of integrity and vision, united in purpose, and for increased cooperation between the mission and the churches
- SIM Niger, as we navigate the security tensions of the Sahel region. Pray that
 doors will continue to be open so that Nigeriens can respond to the gospel

Fulani

There are approximately 20 million Fulani in Nigeria. More workers are needed in this Muslim community, which shows openness to friendship evangelism and Christian media.

We collaborate in meeting needs for animal husbandry, primary schools and medicine to Fulani encampments.

Recent attacks by some Fulani herdsmen against Christian farmers have affected attitudes toward this people group. We pray for effective outreach, for national Christians to engage this community in love instead of retaliation, and for opportunities to support and disciple Fulani believers. We praise God for our growing Fulani team, including our Faithful Witness workers!






Marginalised and vulnerable communities

Disadvantaged and vulnerable groups need to experience Christ's love through efforts that provide support and care. SIM Nigeria ministers to youth, orphans, widows, those with disabilities and others society may cast aside.

Please pray for these ministries to expand into the north, where limited resources and few trained workers live. Our workers model the biblical value of caring for human life, training those who care for people with special needs, facilitating income generation, ministering to prisoners and addicts, and engaging in anti-trafficking.

Throughout North Africa there are few resident witnesses of the good new in the local communities. Pray for our workers as they locate to coastal cities and desert towns; that they would find favour and relationships with people of peace.

God is blessing us with more and more workers coming to serve across North Africa. Though the work is difficult, we are seeing fruit where God has placed us. Through businesses and employment opportunities, we are building meaningful relationships with employees, community leaders, neighbours, language teachers and new believers.



The Faithful Witness project is bringing workers from Francophone Africa to serve as campus disciplers. These workers are mobilising Christian sub-Saharan African university students to minister to North African students. Pray for these Christian students to develop a heart for Muslim students, develop friendships and point North Africans to Jesus.





Nomads

Among the 92 ethnic groups in North Africa, 22 are nomadic. Very few workers are bringing the gospel to them. Working with nomads is challenging, requiring creative strategies and adapted methods. Pray for the Bedouins, Tuaregs and Moors. SIM workers in one of the North African desert countries mainly inhabited by these nomads will support and disciple underground church leaders as they lead the small groups of believers across the land.



Saraikis

The traditional homeland of Saraiki speakers is in central Pakistan, where SIM has been working with local churches for decades. The Saraikis are a hospitable people, numbering around 20 million. Pray for many to come to know the Lord.

Paraguay



Vision

Prayer Notes	

Rural subsistence families

Around 40 per cent of Paraguay's population live in scattered, rural, subsistence communities. Oral learning in the Guarani language is strongly preferred. Using oral methods, church planting teams are evangelising, discipling and training church leaders, regardless of the leaders' literacy levels.

Indigenous communities

Many of those who belong to Paraguay's 19 indigenous groups live and die in small, scattered communities without sufficient access to God's good news. An SIM team of mission families has answered a partnership invitation from the indigenous church leaders to unite in evangelism and discipleship efforts. One member of this team also uses his optometry skills to partner with local indigenous believers in bringing God's word to new communities. The recording studio GGG continues to record scripture and study materials into local languages.







The deaf

SIM mission workers are partnering with a local ministry to produce a video translation of the Bible for the deaf in Paraguayan sign language. One team member who lives in a rural area and works with deaf people who do not yet know sign language, teaches them language while using basic Bible stories to reveal God's word to this uniquely isolated, unreached community.

Isola Madre is a ministry in Pucallpa that helps teen mums understand and believe that the baby they have, no matter what the reason for their pregnancy, is a gift from God.


Isola Madre visits mothers in their homes, showing God's love in action and presenting them with the message of salvation for their lives. Isola Madre seeks to



be the extended hand of love and help for these young mothers, providing them with workshops in schools that teach sex education and are focused on preventing teen pregnancy, sexual abuse and abortion.

- the new workers who have recently joined SIM Peru and those who are starting in new projects or locations - that God will guide them and help them as they set up life and ministry

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The Maguindanao

The Maguindanao are the largest of 14 Muslim people groups. The name Maguindanao means 'people of the flooded plain'. They have a population of just over one million, few of whom are believers. They live primarily in the central part of the southern Philippines. Many Maguindanao families have migrated to cities, primarily to seek better work opportunities and to avoid wars between government military forces and the Muslim rebel




groups which affect their lives and livelihoods. Just like us, they want to live in peace.

The Maguindanaons are known for their Islamic zeal. They pride themselves on the fact that since colonial times they have been an unconquered people. Religious leaders and teachers (imams and panditas) preside over religious life. They teach young boys to read and memorise the Qu'ran. However, their belief system is more a form of folk Islam than orthodox Islam. Their Islamic practices are usually mingled with animistic beliefs. Although the Maguindanao do not practise a strict form of Islam, any form of Islam is hard to influence.

A praise item is the completion of the Maguindanaon New Testament and dedication in March, 2022, after almost 70 years of translation work and four generations of translators.

- more Maguindanaons to believe and follow Jesus as they respond to the creative ways the SIM Philippines team is working among them so passionately

Senegal



Vision

SIM Senegal's vision is that Wolof and Wolofphone people would come to know Jesus Christ.

Prayer Notes	
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The Wolof

There are more than five million Wolof in Senegal, and their language is widely spoken by other people groups. Peace is an important cultural value and features in many common greetings. However, only a few hundred Wolof in Senegal have found peace in Jesus, while the rest seek it in Islam, most commonly a form of folk Islam. The Wolof have traditionally been subsistence farmers, but many are now active in trade and hundreds of thousands have moved to the urban sprawl of Dakar to study or seek employment. Young people are frequently on social media and some are engaging with online evangelistic materials in their mother tongue.





Wolof believers

There is a saying in Senegal that to be Wolof is to be Muslim. So, those who have decided to follow Christ face persecution. At times this is physical, but it is regularly social when they are excluded from their communities.

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A change in location and focus

After years of prayer and analysis, we have relocated our office from Cape Town in Western Cape Province to an interim location near Durban in KwaZulu-Natal. This change brings us into a region that is, by many measures, the least reached in South Africa. We are seeking a larger facility in a neighbourhood that will enable us to minister to those communities directly from our headquarters. Xhosa, Indian, and



Portuguese ethnolinguistic communities, religious groups such as Muslims and Hindus and Amazioni, and international students and workers will all be closer to us and more central in our focus.

Many other organisations provide health care in our community. But people will often come to our clinic where we pray for them and give them holistic care. We also send health workers into the community to provide better awareness of self-care.





Muslims

Muslims comprise almost 10 per cent (approximately 2.1 million) of Sri Lanka's population and are increasing.

The Moors, who make up a significant portion of the Muslim community, are mainly descendants of the Arabs who came as traders. Muslim tradesmen who arrived from India are also counted in this group.



The Malays, a smaller Muslim group found in Sri Lanka, are of Malaysian and Indonesian descent.


Muslim influence has grown, due to intermarriage between these people groups and Sri Lankans, political leadership and economic sway. The influence of Muslims far exceeds their numbers. Even though a few hundred people among them have come to follow Christ, there are no churches with congregants or pastors from Muslim backgrounds.

In the last few decades, a small segment of the church has become conscious of the need to share God's love with these neighbours. There has been little opposition to, or initiation of, gospel work among Muslim communities.

SIM is part of a network whose goal is to reach these people through organising conferences, providing training and bringing awareness and direction to the church about outreach to Muslims.

- the church, that it will become aware of the gospel need in Sri Lankan Muslim communities and will dispel inhibitions about relating to them and will learn how best to share the gospel
- the salvation of the 2.1 million Muslims who live in Sri Lanka
- God to send labourers from Sri Lanka and overseas to train the church to reach this community

Switzerland

Switzerland's religious situation

Fifty years ago, nearly 100 per cent of all Swiss were either Catholic or Reformed. Since then, the national churches, especially the Reformed church, have decreased severely. Today 35 per cent of the population are Catholic and 23 per cent are Reformed, but only about half believe there is only one God and regularly attend church




services. Fully 28 per cent of the Swiss people no longer belong to any religion. This is the fastest growing group. Another recent study has shown that it is very difficult to transmit the faith from one generation to another.

The number of evangelical churches is growing but remains at around 2.5 per cent. Studies have found that these evangelical churches reach only 'institutionally-minded people' and make little impact on others, particularly among the younger generation. Faith is not seen as relevant in modern Swiss society — a significant challenge for mission workers. The same studies also revealed a lack of churches in rural and suburban zones.

People on the coast

One of the areas where Christ is least known is along the south east coast of Tanzania, hence our motto: "The Coast, for Christ, by the Church."

Most of the people in the communities we serve are living day-to-day. Fishers take out their dhows or dugouts, hoping to catch enough each day to sell to meet their needs.

Most are strongly influenced by Islam and traditional healers. Many live




in constant fear of being cursed. Only Jesus can set them free.

Our prayer is that local churches, though small, will take up the challenge of reaching out to their neighbours who do not know Christ. Pray for us as we join hands with them in this adventure.

A typical outreach consists of door-to-door evangelism during the week, with an invitation to the Jesus Film that will be shown later that week. In the past, this has led to the planting of small churches, which are still operating to this day. Pray for more churches to catch this vision, so they can play a role in seeing the church multiply in nearby villages where there are no churches yet.

- local churches to join in the outreaches to those communities who are living and dying without Christ, especially along the coast
- firm-standing leaders for the newly-planted churches, as they struggle daily to overcome challenges while continuing to serve the body of Christ
- new believers to stand firm as they face many discouragements and hardships
- God's blessing on the church-run Christian primary school, as we trust Him for provision to finish this building
- the women who are being trained in the income-generating projects of baking and handicrafts, as they venture out to support their families

Thailand



Vision

By faith, we see the least-reached communities of Thailand responding authentically to the gospel and being discipled into biblically-based, community-transforming churches which engage in mission.

Motivated by Christ's love, we strive to make disciples where he is not yet known.

The central Thai

There are very few Christians (0.25 per cent) among the Thai who live in the central plain region, which includes the capital, Bangkok. Many districts and sub-districts in this region have no known Christians and no Christian workers. SIM is building multi-skilled, multi-ethnic, church planting teams to serve this significant group of people in Thailand.

University students

There are 2.5 million students at universities in Thailand. Many of these students come from areas where Christ is not known.


University is often a time of self-exploration and consideration of new ideas, which creates great opportunities to introduce students to Christ. Most of Thailand's universities have no Christian ministry among students.





Teaching English is a large and strategic opportunity, because the new Association of South East Asian Nations (ASEAN) community has chosen English as its medium of communication. Students know their career success will depend on their ability to speak English. Our desire is to have workers who are committed to building relationships with Thai university students, evangelising and making disciples of new believers.

- God to provide workers with a passion to serve university students

Vision

We see dynamic, inter-dependent partnerships and mutually nurturing relationships with the Evangelical Church Winning All (ECWA-Togo), other mission organisations, and churches, as we respond together to the spiritual challenges in Togo and focus on proclaiming the gospel among people groups with little Christian witness.

- Leadership and theological training.
- Church partnerships.
- Partnering with believers to reach and disciple their own people, particularly through a farm and discipleship centre.
- Friendship evangelism and discipleship with neighbours and friends.

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The Met

The largest of the Muslim people groups in Togo is the Met. The majority live in the central city of Sokodé and in the 60 or so surrounding villages. Over the years, Met communities have also formed in villages and cities around the country and abroad.

Muslim traders brought Islam to this people group in the mid-1800s. Now, at least 90 per cent of them are practising




Muslims, though many in the villages mix Islam with their traditional animistic religion.

About one per cent of the Met people are now Jesus-followers. The believers in the central city have their own association to offer a sense of family, because most are rejected by their own families once they leave Islam. This group takes responsibility for life events such as weddings and funerals and are there in times of need, gathering to pray and giving what they can.

With a heart to reach their own people who are living and dying without Christ, this large group of Met believers has also developed an evangelism team. They are concentrating on villages where few have heard the gospel, Islam is practised, and traditional religious beliefs influence all sectors of life.

Vision

We work with UK churches to send and receive cross-cultural workers equipped to make disciples wherever people live and die without hearing God's good news

We aim to: provide services that are highly valued by churches, workers, and SIM globally; work with evangelical churches in multicultural areas of the UK; help UK churches engage, evangelise and establish new believers in their communities where Christ is least known; make the pathways to mission in, to, and from, the UK, more accessible and effective; engage more young people with the global gospel needs.

- Equipping UK churches for intercultural ministry.

Engaging diverse communities

Overcoming barriers of difference with the gospel is a core need for UK churches. Recent surveys (2022) tell us six per cent of UK adults are practising Christians, with non-white ethnicities making up 25 per cent of them.

Among 18-24-year-olds in the UK:

29 per cent identify with Christianity

- 27 per cent do not affiliate with any main religion or define themselves as atheist or agnostic (up from 11 per cent in 2015)
- 20 per cent would say they are atheist
- 14 per cent affiliate with Islam.

Churches are asking for help in the mission field on their doorsteps and globally. Our ENGAGE programme brings mission workers into UK churches, helping them bridge cultural gaps, respond to needs and share the gospel.

- more workers from the UK to be sent into SIM teams worldwide
- praise God for incoming workers serving UK communities and pray for the visas and funding needed to sustain this
- multi-ethnic mission teams working with healthy, diverse churches across the UK

United States



Vision

Our wildly important goal focuses on sending and sustaining more overseas American ambassadors of Jesus. We are committed to go from a shrinking mission workforce (-3 per cent per year) to a growing missionworkforce (+3 per cent per year) by 1 July 2022. Through eyes of faith, we see 100 new workers being sent per year by 2030. A steady annual 10 per cent increase in mission worker sending will achieve this goal.

Ministry

By prayer, we recruit, prepare, and journey with Christians sent by churches as we go and make disciples of Jesus Christ where needed most.

Prayer Notes	

The Bride of Christ in America includes tens of thousands of people who have received a calling to go and make disciples where Jesus is least known. SIM USA is committed to helping churches as they work to remind those whom God is leading about their need to respond.


SIM USA has been praying Matthew 9:38 and mobilising the nation to join us in prayer, believing God will raise up workers who will say yes to cross barriers to share his good news where needed most.

Children of the Coast

In "Ciudad de la Costa" (City of the Coast), many empty lots have been taken over by families who have no place to live. They have built homes out of boards and scrap sheet metal. Most of these families have children who, in one way or another, are adapting to this environment. They suffer greatly during the winter with no heating. While the children can attend public schools, they have little help with their homework from their families since, in many cases, their parents never even finished elementary school. Consequently, their academic performance is often severely lowered. Many of these children are also exposed to violence and drugs from a very young age.






In addition to these harsh conditions, the vast majority are living and dying without knowing Christ because Uruguay is the least religious nation in the Americas. That is why several churches, in partnership with SIM Uruguay, have been seeking to make an impact in this population. There are various opportunities to serve in these coastal areas, ranging from tutoring and healthcare to social work and home construction.

Maybe you or someone you know would be interested in stepping into one of these opportunities.

Vision

By faith we see: Vietnamese communities where Christ is least known being engaged by a multi- thnic team with the gospel, reflecting Christ through character, word and action; God's people belonging to growing, maturing, indigenous, and mission-minded churches, being and making disciples of Jesus in Vietnam and beyond.

- Develop church leaders through theological education and training for biblical relationships in home, church and community. Training Vietnamese chaplains to help those in trauma by providing them with God's love and comfort.
- Being witnesses in the workplace through various missional business methods.
- Establish in-country support services for a growing team of workers.

Prayer Notes

Minority communities

There are approximately 68 unreached people groups in Vietnam. Of those, 30 have fewer than one per cent professing Christians, and 15 have no Christ followers.

In these communities, when a person receives Jesus Christ as Saviour, he or she is eager to follow the biblical mandate to lead others to



Christ by making, baptising and teaching disciples (Matthew 28:19-20).

The new believer's response is often to plant and shepherd a church in his or her community. These pastors have low education and Bible knowledge levels. Their risk of persecution is high. Their journey can be lonely, with no one available to encourage or guide them to grow in their new faith.

Majority community

The Kinh people, the majority community in Vietnam, make up 86 per cent of the population. They have Christian resources available, but only 1.2 per cent of the more than 78 million Viet-Kinh are followers of Christ. This makes the Kinh people the largest unreached people group in south east Asia.

- minority pastors and those they shepherd. Pray they can hear and understand God's word and teach others accurately so more can hear the good news
- the Kinh majority community to be awakened to the good news of Jesus and share it boldly with others
- believers to have a growing vision to reach out boldly to those who have not yet heard of Jesus; churches lacking a pastor to receive one with adequate Bible knowledge
- for courage and perseverance for those facing persecution for their faith
- training Vietnamese to equip their own people and developing leaders to teach biblical principles for godly living.
- the nation to be tolerant of Christian activities; for Communist Party members, government officials and military personnel, who pillars in Vietnamese society
- a permanent presence to be established in support of workers. Pray to the Lord to provide workers who will live in Vietnam and make disciples in culturally appropriate ways

WAMO West Africa Missions Office



Vision

Convinced that no one should live and die without hearing God's good news, the West African Mission Office partners with the West African church for the success of global mission; mobilises and sends qualified, equipped workers from and through the West African church all over the world, to cross cultural barriers with love to those living and dying without Christ; enables the making of disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ in communities where he is least known, through workers sent from West Africa.

- Mobilising in West Africa for the recruitment of new workers.
- Partnering with local like-minded churches, mission organisations, and other regional bodies in West Africa for global mission.
- Training and sending mission workers from West Africa.

Prayer Notes

The Wolof and Maninka of Senegal

The Wolof are a large ethnic group, with a population of nearly three million. Most of them are located in the West African countries of Senegal and Gambia. Some are in Cote d'Ivoire and Mali, where Christ is least known.

Muslims make up 99.49 per cent of the Wolof in Senegal, while Christians are 0.01 per cent.

The Maninka of Senegal are located in eastern Senegal, where they constitute a subgroup of a much larger people group known as the Mande. Muslims make up 90 per cent of the population, while Christians are a paltry 0.3 per cent. Evangelicals make up just 0.1 per cent.

Since both the Wolof and the Maninka claim to be Muslims and believe in the Qur'an, the holy book of Islam, there is a great need for labourers who are sensitive to the Muslim culture to work among the Wolof and Maninka to share Christ's love.

- traditional Muslim culture to soften, creating open doors for the gospel to be preached among the Wolof and Maninka
- God to grant wisdom and favour to mission agencies seeking to work among the Wolof and Maninka
- God to reveal himself to the Wolof and Maninka through dreams and visions
- God to detach the Wolof and Maninka from the spirit of Islam
- the effectiveness of the Jesus film and other evangelistic tools among the Wolof and Maninka
- God to raise up a prayer team to break up the soil through worship and intercession







West Malaysia



Vision

Our vision is to see every people group in this country reached with Christ's love. Our aim is for all the believers in West Malaysia to be discipled and equipped with the vision, skills, and resources to proclaim the message of reconciliation with God, in word and deed, among communities where Christ is not known.

We strive to share God's love among the least-reached peoples, including Orang Asli, migrants, expatriates and international students in West Malaysia. We are also working to establish a collaboration of churches, mission groups, and Christian leaders which aims to make disciples of our Lord Jesus in communities where he is least known, ministering at home and abroad.

- Humanitarian work among Orang Asli, migrants and refugees.
- Friendship evangelism among expatriates and international students.
- Partnership with mission groups in theological education and leadership training.
- Community-building projects and church plantings among the diaspora groups in the big cities.

Prayer Notes	

Orang Asli

The Orang Asli or 'original peoples' were estimated to account for about 0.7 per cent of the population of West Malaysia, numbering about 198,000 in 2017. Officially, there are 18 tribes of Orang Asli in Malaysia, each with its own culture, religion and language. They are the oldest people groups of Malaysia but are also the poorest and most oppressed. Although some have decided to follow Islam or Christianity, they are traditionally animists. In recent years, they have retreated farther back into the forest to avoid demands to assimilate to the majority culture or convert to another religion.

Migrants and refugees

Many people have come to Malaysia in search of a better future for their families. There are an estimated six million migrants in Malaysia, but less than half of them are documented. Almost all of them live and work in the country without proper permits or wages. As of March 2020, there were nearly 180,000 refugees and asylum seekers registered with the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) in Malaysia. Like undocumented migrants, refugees don't have legal rights to live a normal life here. Their human rights are often violated. God is calling us to reach out to them with Christ's love.

Expatriates and international students

There were about 140,000 expatriates and their dependents in Malaysia, as of October 2021. Most are from India, followed by China, Japan, the Philippines and Indonesia. A large number are also business owners or partners who invest in various industries in this country. The majority live in the big cities with their families.

International students continue to choose Malaysia to study because of the quality education available. There are around 130,000 international students from 136 countries studying here. Most of them come from south east Asia, the Middle East, Central Asia and African countries, with some also from Europe.

By working with our mission partners, we seek to reach them with the gospel through friendship evangelism, making disciples who can engage with their own cultures when they return home.

Pray for

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- the removal of barriers, so that God's love can be shared freely across the country to all
- more trained workers to serve among the migrants, refugees, expatriates and international students
- increased participation and partnership with local churches to do God's mission on the doorstep
- resources and staff to mobilise local churches and support incoming workers

Zambia



Vision

The vision of SIM Zambia is to be a witness to Christ's love where he is least known, expressing God's love and compassion and teaching disciples to do likewise, resulting in Christ-centred churches across Zambia.

Children and young people

With more than half the population under the age of 18, young people need to be reached and discipled for Christ. Traditionally, the church has not prioritised ministry to children and youth and many of the programmes in place have not brought about transformational growth. These younger ones are loved by the Lord Jesus and have the opportunity



to make a lifetime of impact on their families and culture for the glory of God and the witness of his church.

Asian diaspora


Asian diaspora communities are growing fast. SIM encourages the work of one small Asian church which is seeking to be a faithful witness yet is limited in outreach capacity amongst such a large population. With mosques and Hindu and Buddhist temples on the increase, more focus is required to impact these communities who need Christ.

Pray for

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- the SIM Zambia Board, as they seek to appoint a new director and provide strategic direction for our ministries
- God to send the right people to fill key personnel needs
- the youth centre staff and secondary school chaplain as they disciple and encourage young people to grow in their faith
- our health workers for wisdom, protection and stamina as they minister to the physical and spiritual needs of their patients
- our community development ministry, which teaches rural farmers ways to grow food for their families effectively, may impact their lives spiritually
- our disciple-making and leadership training ministries with local churches, Bible colleges, in schools and on university campuses - that they would impact individuals who will then be able to share their faith with others
- those who teach and minister to children in their school and community contexts that these young lives would be changed for eternity
- the diaspora in Zambia to hear and be transformed by the gospel

Zimbabwe



Vision

By faith, we see a witness of Christ to every Zimbabwean, so that no one lives and dies without hearing the gospel and responding to it; believers are discipled into a fuller understanding of their faith; and Christ's compassionate love is expressed and shared with the poor, hurting and suffering.

- Outreach ministries: children, particularly vulnerable girls, young people, college and university students, HIV and AIDS.
- Theology and resources: theological education, Leaders Equipping and Resourcing Network (LEARN), research, and witness to cults.

The Nambya People

The Nambya people are an ethnic group of about 100,000, based in the north western parts of Zimbabwe. They are found around the coal mining town of Hwange and in the areas surrounding Victoria Falls.

They believe in a supreme being and ancestors who heal and protect them from evil; they also believe ancestral spirits are benevolent or malevolent and can inspire individual talents such as healing. According to the Joshua project, the Nambya of Zimbabwe, are engaged yet unreached. The primary religion practised by the Nambya is ethnoreligion. This is deeply rooted in a people's ethnic identity and conversion to Christ requires patience and understanding the culture.

- more Nambyan people to come to know Jesus and therefore stand as witnesses in their communities
- gospel workers who can communicate fluently in the Nambyan language
- SIM Zimbabwe to have an opportunity to reach Nambyan people with the gospel







Vision

Our vision is to see a global movement of churches using sport to make disciples of Jesus Christ among young people, their families, and communities.

We strive to share a vision for local churches and church planters to use sport as a powerful ministry tool; train Christian leaders to develop fruitful, church-centred sports ministries that make disciples of Jesus; equip coaches for effective service by providing ongoing support and encouragement to help them live, lead, minister and coach for the glory of God; develop the leadership capacity of sports ministry coordinators, who will provide vision, guidance and management for the local sports ministry movement and develop coaches at the local church level.

Ministry

Globally, 42 per cent of the population is under the age of 25. In 18 countries, Sports Friends is training and equipping local church leaders and church planters to extend the love of God to young people through strategic sports ministries. Weekly sports programmes and ongoing disciple-making are complemented by the Sports Friends camping ministry.

Prayer Notes	

One Little Boy

Forty teenaged boys arrived with their coaches at Lake Langano in summer of 2006. However, there was one boy who didn't belong at camp that year. David (name changed) was only about 10 and small for his age. He was from a village where there were no Christians, and the coach had been praying for an opportunity to build relationships through



football. He felt David was the answer to his prayer so, at the risk of being scolded, he brought the too-little boy to camp.

But David was not intimidated by being the smallest, and he learned what God thought of him. He put his faith in Jesus at camp and was filled with passion for the Saviour who loved him. David returned to his village and told his family about his time at camp and about Jesus. One by one they trusted in Christ, and saving faith spread rapidly.

But God had planned to move even more powerfully in this little community. Just two months after camp, Jesus visited David one evening in a vision and, over the next few months, more than 70 people turned to worship Jesus. A church was planted in this village where just one year before there had been no Christian witness. David's coach visited the community faithfully to disciple David and the church God birthed through his testimony.

It has been 16 years since that summer camp, and David continues to serve the church as a pastor and sports minister. He has big faith and is passionate about reaching those from the same background as his family.

- David's ongoing zeal, strength, and opportunity to bear witness to Christ among the least reached peoples of Ethiopia. Pray for the many others like David throughout Sport Friends globally who are seeking to reach the lost
- more than 250,000 young people are currently being served and encouraged by roughly 12,000 coaches. Pray that these young people would encounter Christ and that their coaches would be effective in making disciples
- God to provide wisdom and insight as we seek to develop new resources for discipleship
- God to raise up new workers who will diversify and strengthen our teams for effective service

International Leadership & Services

Vision

Ministry

The ministries of SIM International Leadership and Services clear barriers for those whom God is calling to serve cross-culturally.

We achieve this by providing:

- global leadership and training.
- cross-cultural people and ministry development in more than 70 countries.
- worldwide personnel, financial and technical support to remote mission locations.
- direction and planning for the expansion and long-term sustainability of SIM priority ministries and projects.
- communications and multi-lingual resources.

Children

Children are a precious gift from God to all communities worldwide. They are created in his image, uniquely gifted by him, and can be participants in church and mission. We have the privilege and responsibility of caring care for them, praying for their protection, and helping them live life in fullness. Sadly, half of all children are at risk of forced labour, hunger, abandonment, abuse, trafficking and poverty.

Vulnerable children are those aged under 18 whose safety, well-being, or development is at significant risk due to inadequate care, protection or access to essential services.

One group among them are children caught up in violence due to local, regional or international conflicts. Violence from gangs and trafficking is as devastating to the young as war. Physically surviving armed conflicts can leave long-term psychological scars and have profound consequences for a lifetime. Children in such circumstances are beyond the reach of both safety and of the gospel.

Conflicts tear families apart, resulting in children being separated from their parents or, worse, orphaned. War cuts off food and water supplies, blocks access to healthcare, stops education, destroys economies and jobs, and opens up opportunities for the recruitment of child soldiers and child slaves.

The Lord is clear about his supreme priority of care and protection for children (Matt. 18:6). Dozens of ministries of SIM and our partners focus directly on children, while all our ministries touch on and impact children. We also serve in areas where both old and new conflicts continue to seethe. May the Holy Spirit guide and equip us to rescue, guard, and nourish these precious little ones.



Vision

Faithful Witness in Forgotten Communities is SIM's global initiative to mobilise multicultural, multi-skilled teams to make Jesus known in communities where people are living and dying without ever making a Christian friend. We provide funding for new workers sent from diverse contexts around the world to share the good news with those who have never heard. Our vision is to see the gospel message take root in these forgotten communities. We have launched teams in the Middle East, eastern Chad, Mali, northern Nigeria, Thailand, North Africa, and south Asia.

Prayer Notes

Over the next 10 years, the Faithful Witness Initiative would like to see God establish 20 new multi-ethnic, multi-skilled teams in 20 communities where Jesus isn't known yet.

- Praise God for 52 mission workers sent from 19 different nations to seven least reached destinations
- Ask God for another 50 workers to join them from an even greater diversity of SIM sending entities
- Praise God for the seven existing teams
- Ask God for three new teams to be launched in three other communities
- Praise God for the power to cross barriers with the gospel in Chad, Thailand, North Africa, northern Nigeria, the Middle East, and south Asia
- Ask God to give clear guidance as to where we should send the next three teams
- Praise God for sending courageous, quality and extremely diverse workers
- Ask God to make ethnic and social reconciliation central to the good news that these teams embody
- Ask God for unity of purpose and a solid bond of the peace that Jesus won for us at the cross
- Praise God for donors from around the world who have provided so generously for Faithful Witness workers
- Ask God for even greater and broader financial participation so that SIM can send workers from anywhere the church is, to everywhere it is not
- Praise God for protecting the teams
- Ask God to make his faithful witnesses thrive in hard places
- Ask God for stability where there is conflict, social favour where there is tension and to meet human need where there is a chronic lack of food and water
- Above all, ask God that many would believe and obey him, bringing glory to the name of Jesus

Additional countries where SIM workers serve

Burundi

Working with Serge Medical Team, we are training medical professionals and students. We ask for prayer that our teaching would be blessed - that those we teach would gain not only medical knowledge but also how to love and care for patients with the love of Christ.

Central Asia

1 CORINTHIANS 6:19-20


